Debate

Mr. Siekman's class of twenty-four debaters, six seniors, twelve juniors and six sophomores, has a very outstanding record this year.

In all tournaments, eleven Hastings teams won one hundred twenty-six debates and lost thirty-seven. In contest "meets" alone, eleven teams won one hundred and lost nineteen. Senior debaters, Bob Fuller, Dick Hunter, Gus Douvas, Ray Scholtz, and Marko Haggard who composed the major Hastings teams, won sixty-five contests and lost eleven.

Hastings debaters entered eight tournaments and won five. Those entered were at Midland, Wesleyan, Holdrege, Doane, Hastings College, and Norfolk.

At the Annual Midland Tournament Gus Douvas won the one hundred dollar Scholarship as the best debater in the tournament. In the Norfolk Invitational Meet both Hastings teams were undefeated and won the debate trophy. Ray Scholtz was first place medal winner. Hastings' "A" team won the "A" division trophy in the Lebanon tournament with sixteen wins and no defeats.

Declamatory

Hastings speech students won the sweepstakes cup in the Hastings College Speech Festival. Hastings debaters ranked third and fourth in team results. Gus Douvas and Marko Haggard received two of the three superior rankings awarded to individual debaters.

Eight declamatory students, coached by F. M. Hawk, made an outstanding record in the three contests they entered. At the Kearney Inter-High School Contest, March 21, first place was given to the one-act play "The Woman Who Understood Men." The cast included Billee McManigal, Gladys Lynge, Clark Marshall, Harriett Pratt and Kenneth Einsel.

At the Hastings College Speech Festival on February 21 and 22, first place was given to Dorothy McDermott, humorous reading; Marko Haggard, original oratory; and Gladys Lynge, humorous reading. "The Woman Who Understood Men" again received first place.

March 28 at the District Four Declamatory and One-act Play Contest in Loup City, Hastings entered the class A division.

Superiors were won by Dorothy McDermott, humorous reading; Charlene Wicker, dramatic reading; and the play "The Woman Who Understood Men." Excellents were received by Marko Haggard, original oratory; Don Hughes, extemporaneous speaking; and Harriett Pratt, interpretative oratory.

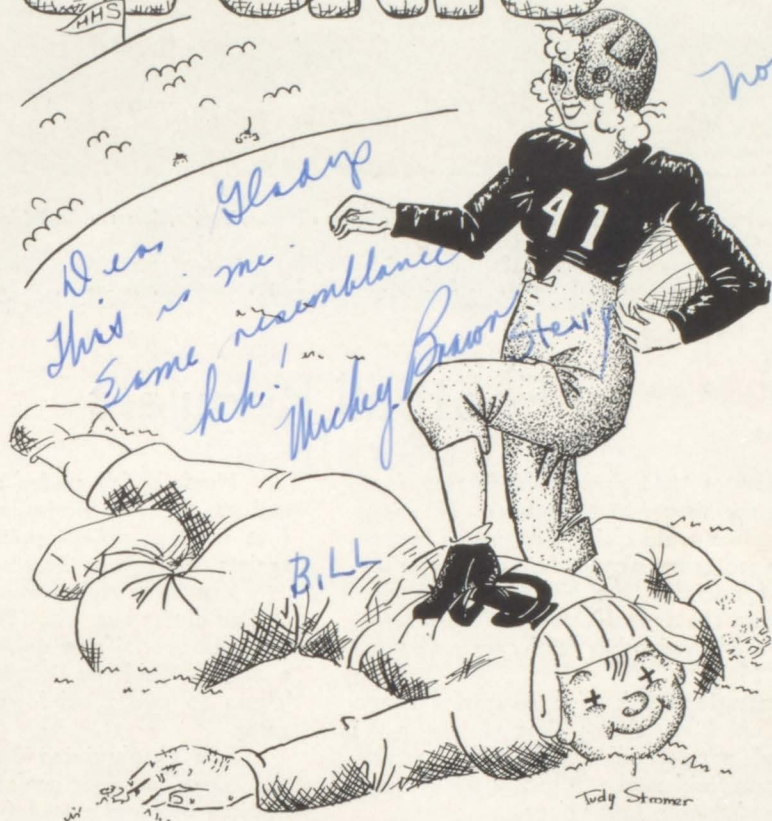

Football Regulars

The season of 1940 gave us the greatest football team in the history of the school. No major team in the state could claim a record so impressive. In the ten games played the Tigers were undefeated and untied. The Mid-East conference crown and also the annual Omaha World Herald mythical state championship trophy were awarded to Hastings High.

The measuring stick of a successful season this year, as usual, was the thrilling victory in the bitter struggle with Grand Island. Eleven weary, fighting Tigers finished the full sixty minutes and held the Islanders to a lone safety.

The Tigers made a good early season showing in beating Jackson 19-7 in the first game. Then a highly touted Fairbury team fell before the Tigers to the tune of 38-6. A capacity crowd of almost 5,000 enthusiasts jammed the bowl at McCook to see the Tigers whip the unbeaten Bisons. In the five times the Tigers had possession of the ball they marched to three touchdowns, punted once and ended the game holding the ball.

Norfolk fell under an avalanche of passes and was the sixth victim in the Tiger march. The first team scored 26 points in thirteen minutes against the Kearney Bearcats.

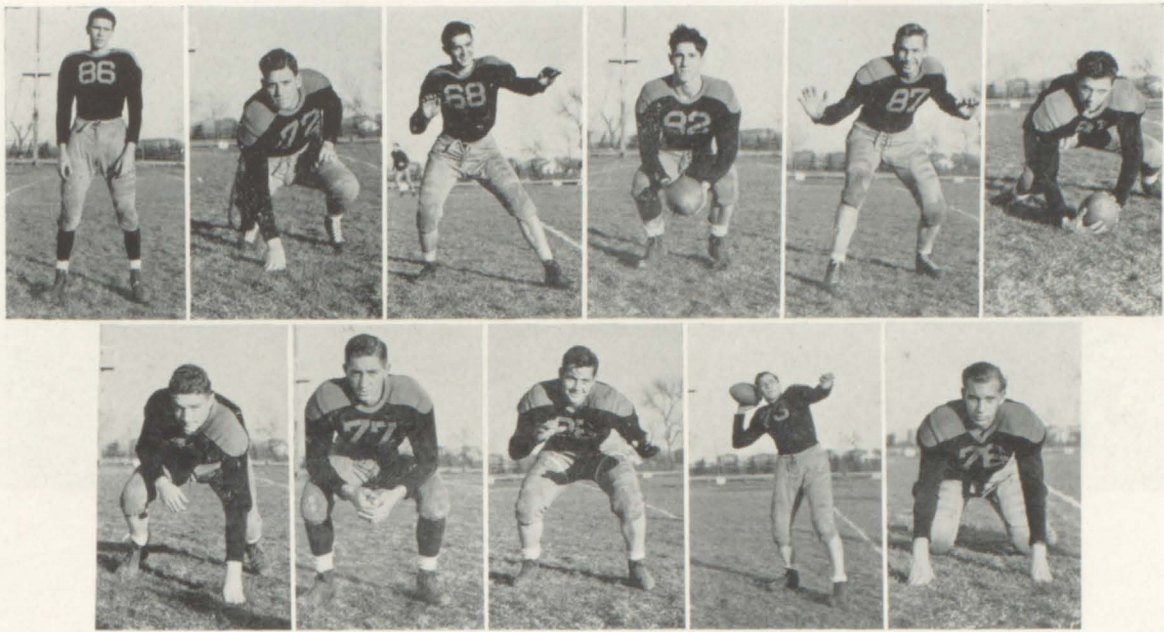
The York Dukes were leading the Tigers 7-6 at half-time but the Tigers came back and punched over fifteen points in the last half. On a slippery field the Beatrice Orangemen held the Tigers to two touchdown in the last Mid-East game.

In a Thanksgiving Day game at North Platte the Tigers had their perfect record at stake. The inspired Bulldogs scored first and were leading at the end of the third quarter by thirteen to twelve. But the visitors came back and made the final score eighteen to thirteen.

Untold credit is due Coach Eldon Miller in building this championship team which rolled up a total of 2,303 yards compared to the 940 of their opponents. The statistics as well as the scores bear evidence of the Tigers' superiority in every game.

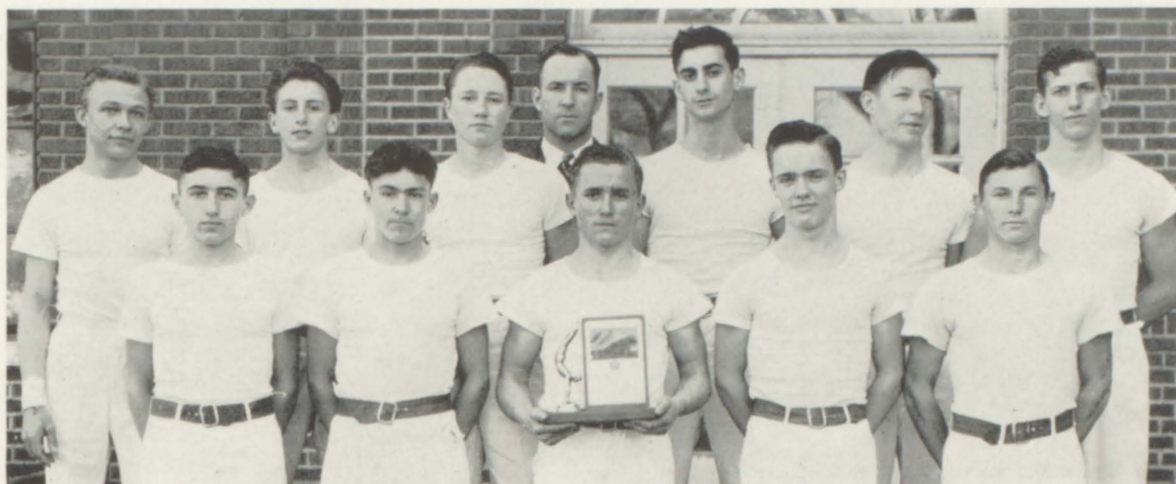
The Reserves chalked up six touchdowns against the Nelson seconds. The Nuckolls County boys crossed the double line only once against the team of their former coach.

Although they defeated Jackson 23-22, a loss to Fairbury put the Tigers in a tie position for the Mid-East honors with Jackson High of Lincoln. The Tigers scored 110 points while their rivals had 112. The worst trouncing Hastings had was at the hands of Lincoln to the tune of 41-23. The season's high was 49 points against North Platte as the Tigers turned red-hot and poured in baskets from all angles.

The Tigers won a hard fought 40-38 victory against G. I. during the course of the regular season. The third city boys retaliated by eliminating the Tigers from the District Tourney. The score was 26-24 in a nip-and-tuck game. Both games were characterized by the usual high spirit of rivalry.

For the first time in 20 years the Orange and Black was not represented in the state tournament. This is one of the longest standing records of successive participation in the State Meet.

Track

Some fifty candidates reported for track this year including three lettermen—Warren Burr as dash man, Jerry Taylor in the sprints, and George Stransky in field events.
