At the beginning of the school year the Edgar High School received a gift of about 750 books from the Edgar Library Association, which was certainly appreciated.

For the accommodation of these books a Library room was constructed in the basement of the School building into which book cases were moved and shelving built. The books were arranged in the following sections: Biography, Essays, Fiction, History, Poetry, Psychology, Sociology, Theology and Travel.

To expedite the handling of these books, a card catalogue system was installed, comprising three files: One for titles, one for authors, and one for subject matter.

A Library Board was appointed to take care of the Library work for the year. Hazel Koher, Head Librarian; Lena Grossman, Assistant Librarian; Laurene Elliott, Second Assistant Librarian; Beulah Grossman, Third Assistant Librarian.

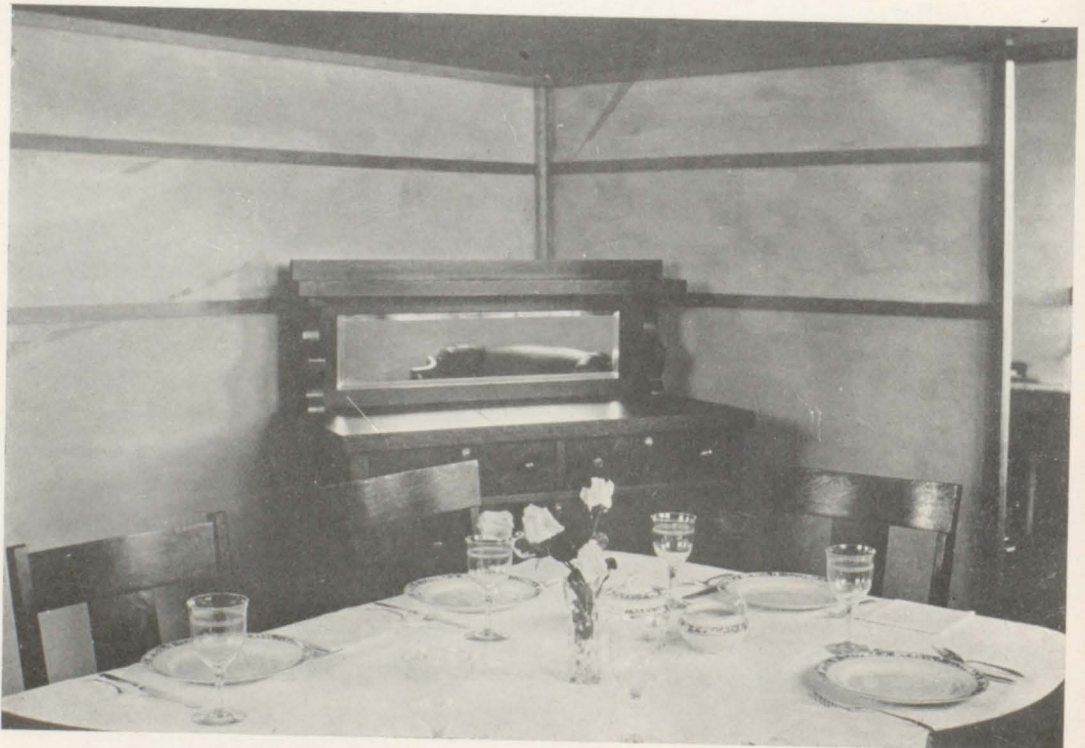
This has been a great benefit to the High School in two ways; it has provided a means for more extensive work in the English department, and has provided training in Library work for those interested in this line.



HOME ECONOMICS

Edgar has one of the best equipped Home Economics Laboratories in the State. The girls take very much interest in the work provided for them by Mrs. Carl Slatt. They are taught to serve the best of food in the best manner, and with the best economy in both labor and money. There is a sewing laboratory equipped with four foot-power and one electric sewing machines, also lockers and tables.

Both Laboratories are equipped to accommodate twenty pupils with complete outfit. The dining room is prepared to serve twelve people with the best accommodations.



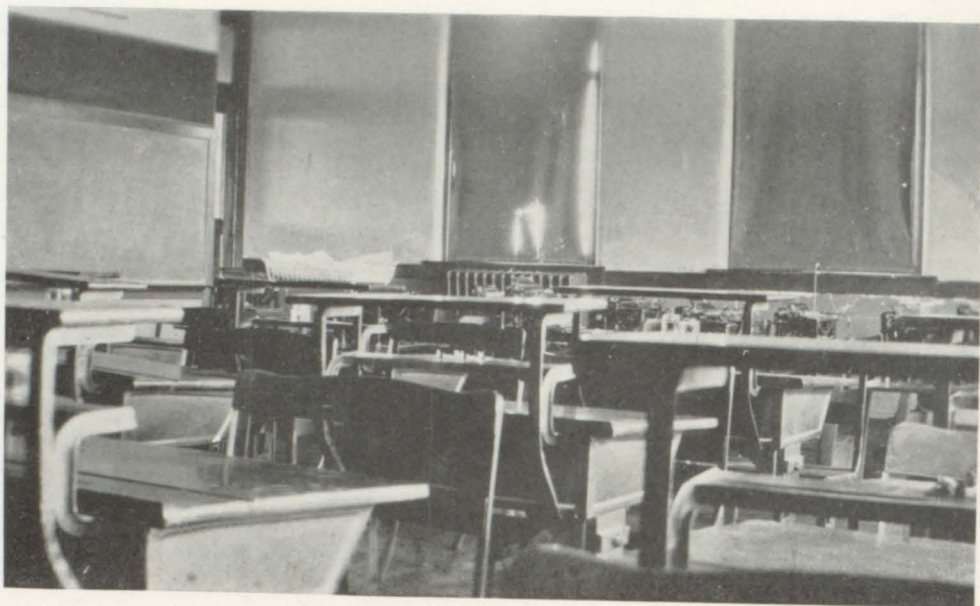


NORMAL TRAINING

The Normal Trainers organized September 16, 1921. Officers were elected for the present term as follows: Roland Beebe, President; Millie Ethington, Vice President; Lola James, Second Vice President; Caroline Wagar, Secretary. Roland soon moved to Clay Center and the Vice President took his place.

Meetings were held every Friday morning to instruct the Trainers as social leaders in a community and discuss the Nebraska School Laws.

Pins were purchased for each member of the Department, the expenses of which were paid by holding sales and giving a play entitled, "When a Feller Needs a Friend."



COMMERCIAL

The Commercial Department of the Edgar High School has been a success for years. The pupils take great interest in Typewriting, Bookkeeping and Shorthand.

Although the Shorthand course is very hard, they like it and stick to the work.

The Typewriting Classes are very large. We have fourteen typewriters, and they are in very good condition, owing to the fact that students are required to clean and inspect them each week.

The Bookkeeping is another interesting study in the Department. The Commercial room has twenty Bookkeeping desks fully equipped, the American Bookkeeping Course, consisting of three, two and one years is taught.

The Shorthand also comes in a two-year course.

Aside from those Courses already mentioned, the Department offers: Commercial Arithmetic, Commercial, English and Commercial Law.

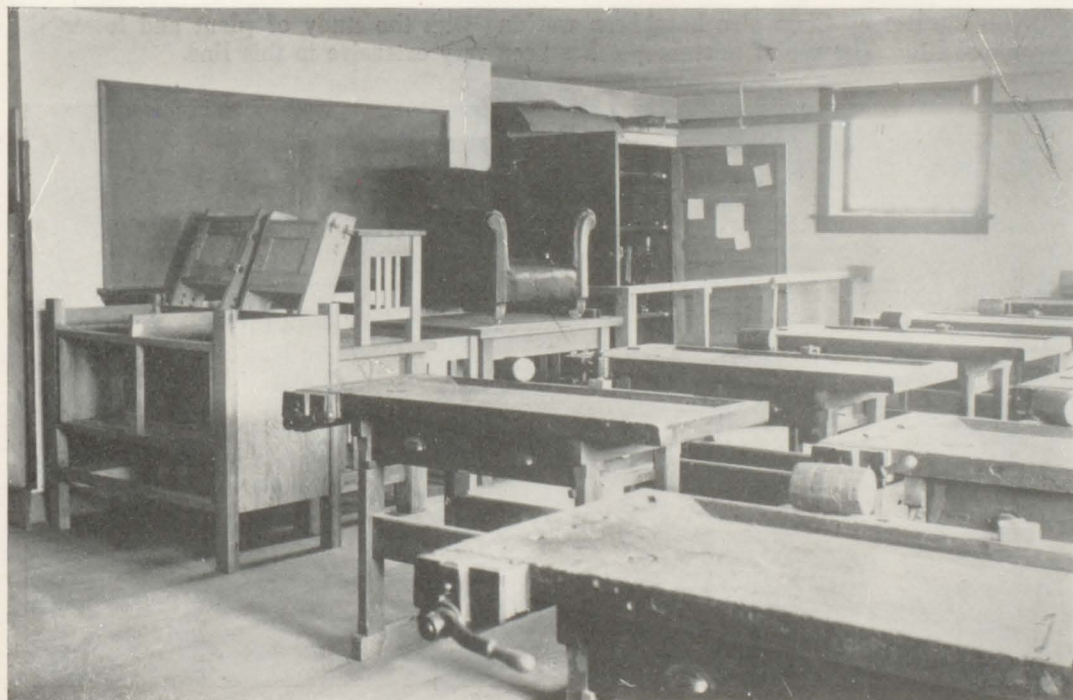
The Commercial Course is open only to Junior and Senior people. There is a Commercial Diploma granted pupils who are graduated from this course.

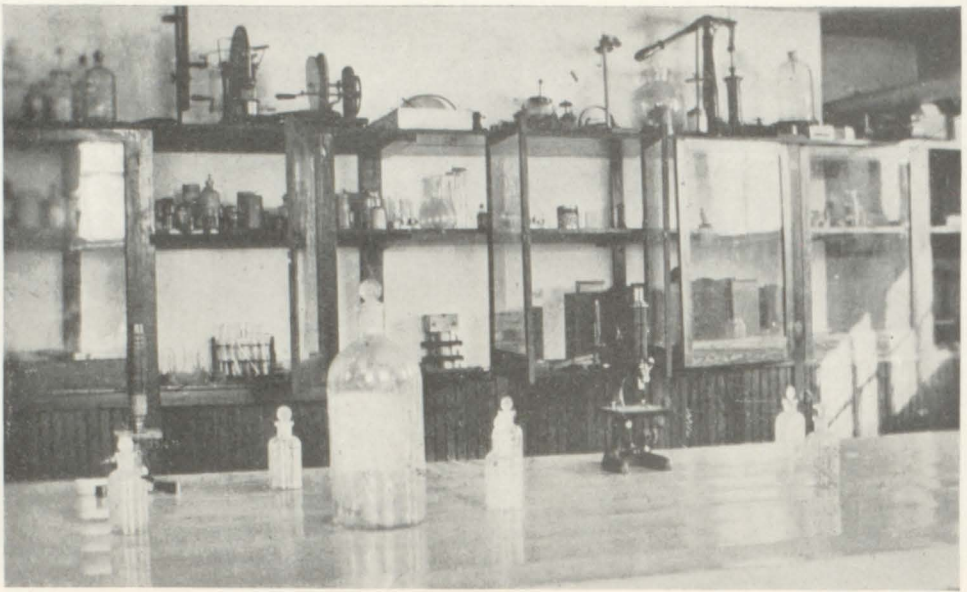
Such an interest has been taken in this work that many post-graduates have returned to complete their line of study in this Department.



MANUAL TRAINING

The Manual Training Department has been very successful in all that it has attempted to do. The boys have made very many useful and elaborate pieces of furniture. The tools and equipment are kept in the best of order. Mr. Correll has shown the boys many fundamentals in woodwork and furniture making. They are taught to take care of the tools and to use them properly. The boys started out with simple joints and projects, and after they had mastered them, they were allowed to make what they wanted under the supervision of Mr. Correll.





SCIENCE

The Science Laboratory has all equipment necessary for the study of chemistry, Physics and Botany. Although Chemistry was eliminated this year, it will be on the schedule strong next year.

The Physics Class have made many and startling experiments under the supervision of Mr. Correll. They have made an intensive study of heat, light, sound, and electricity.

The Botany Class also have been working with the study of plant and lower animal life. The use of microscopes has been very extensive in this line.

FOOTBALL

After three weeks' practice Edgar started the season out right by winning from the Nelson team 13 to 0. The teams were evenly matched in weight and size, but when it came to real football Edgar was much superior.

The following week Edgar went to Blue Hill and played a fast and interesting game. Although both teams were in good condition and worked hard, Edgar was defeated 16 to 6.

The following week Blue Hill was to play at Edgar, but due to sickness forfeited the game to Edgar, 6 to 0.

The next week Edgar played Fairfield on the home gridiron. A good crowd watched the game. After a hard-fought battle, Edgar took the second defeat by a score of 27 to 0.

On the following Friday, Edgar met their third and last defeat of the season. Clay Center had a team that had played together for three years and with the speed of their back field proved too much for our boys. The final score was 35 to 0.

The next week Edgar played Harvard. Although it rained during the whole game, at no time throughout the entire game was the steady advance of the Edgar Eleven stopped, nor was Harvard able to get the pigskin within the danger zone. The final score was 44 to 0.

The following week Edgar went to Superior. Both teams were evenly matched and in good condition and played a 0 to 0 tie.

After four nights of good stiff practice Edgar went to Alexandria where they once more brought home the bacon. The Alexandria team was unable to stop the line plunges and end runs of the Edgar boys which brought the defeat of 10 to 0 to the Alexandria Eleven.

The next week the Edgar team went to Nelson. The Nelson team was not satisfied with one defeat, so the Edgar team went down and brought home the bacon again. The final score was 21 to 0.

On the following Friday after the Nelson game, Edgar played the Geneva team. At the end of the first half it looked bad for our boys, the score was 7 to 0; but in the last half our boys plugged up the weak spots they had found in the first half, and defeated the Geneva Eleven to the tune of 30 to 7.

VERNNA PASKO, Guard, first year. She was a player whom the enemy felt and feared.

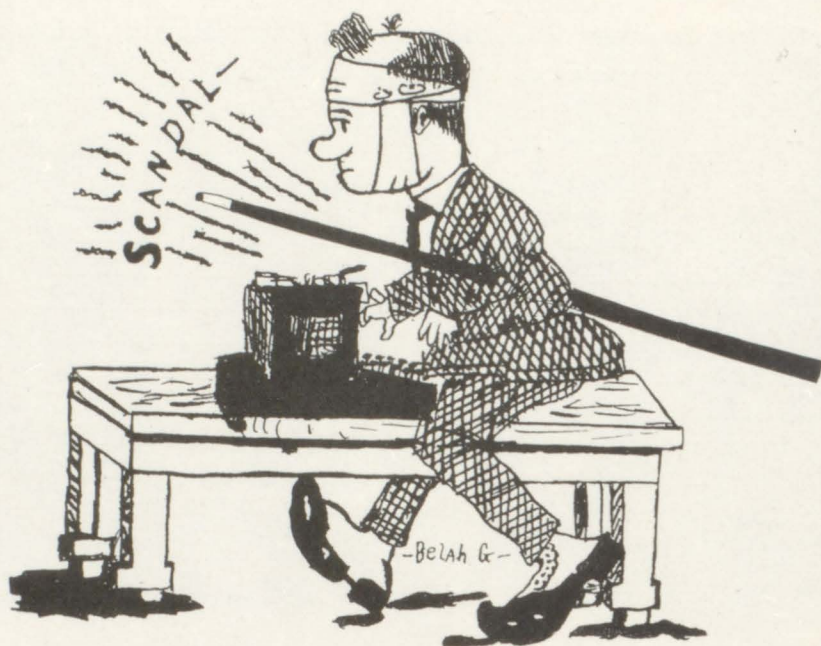

OCTOBER 5—WIENER ROAST

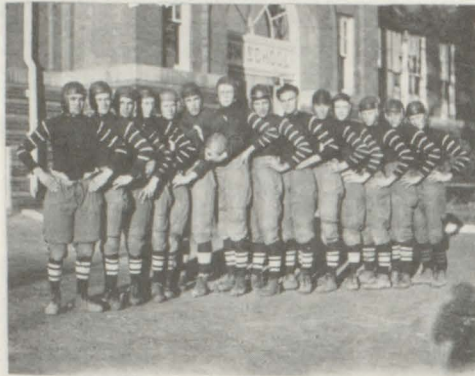
Juniors and Seniors had a Wiener and Marshmallow roast on the Blue at Deweese. Much fun was had over the big bonfire which the boys built.

OCTOBER 31

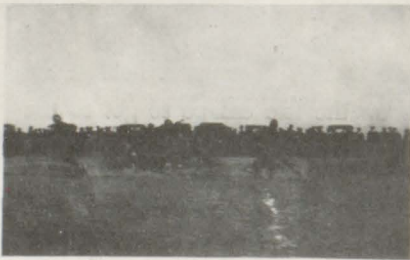

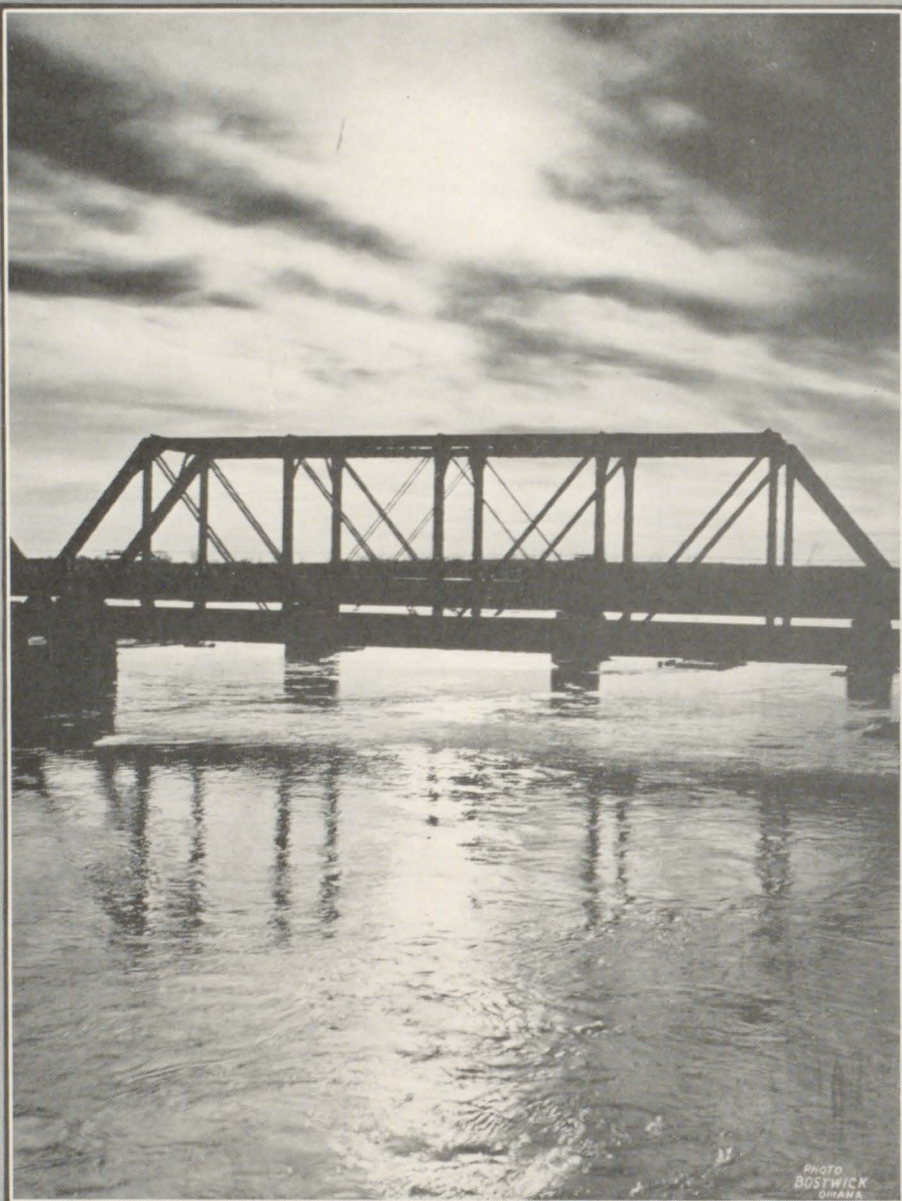

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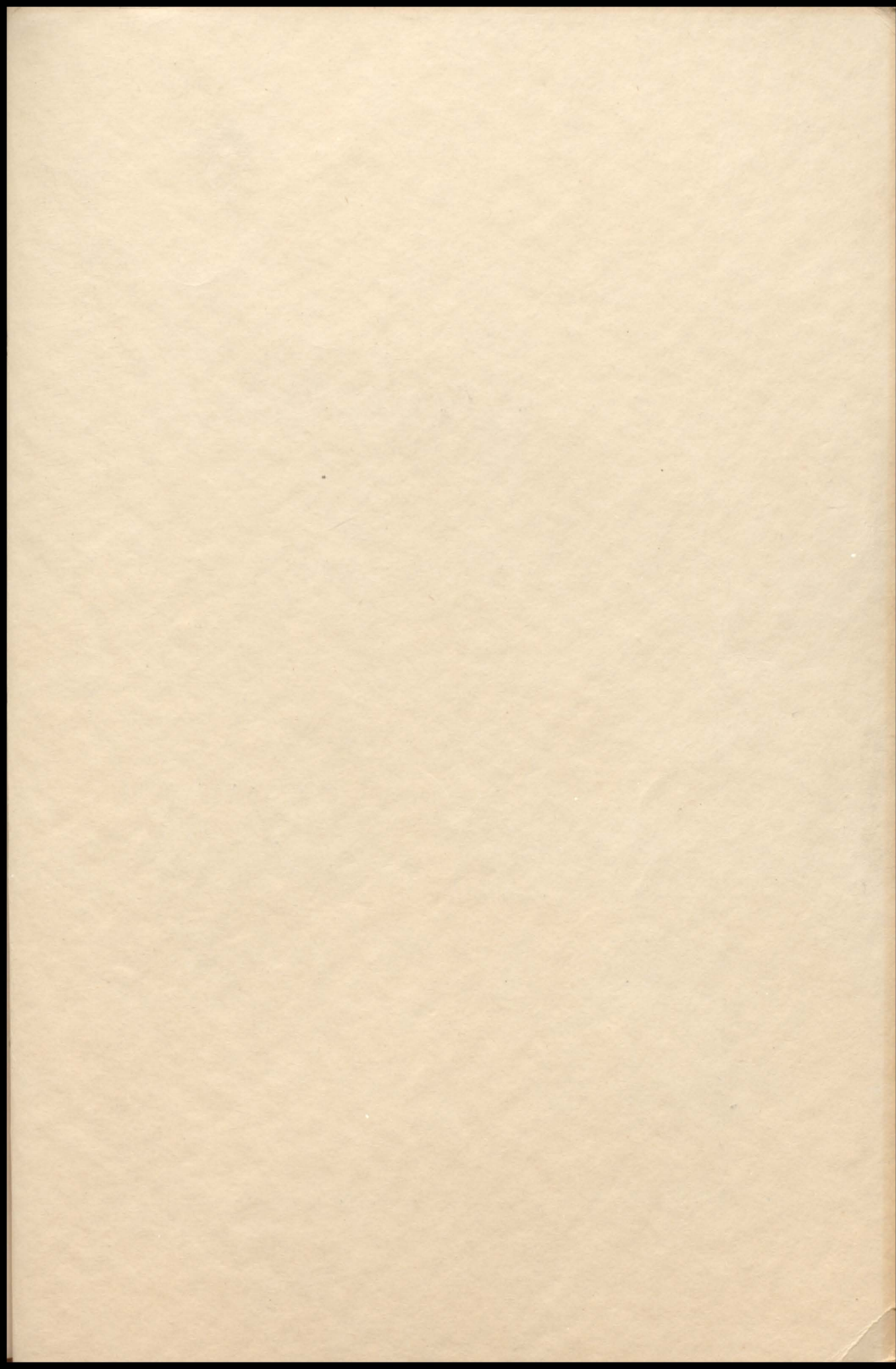
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
