# ACTIVITIES

## SHOP MECHANICS

The first year's work in farm mechanics should deal mainly with the development of proper shop procedures, habits, and attitudes. Instruction in the correct use of tools is also stressed. Correlation of shop work with the supervised farming program is also stressed. Beginning woodwork, laying out lumber to dimensions, wood finishing, form drawing, tool fitting, rope work, and forge work is also emphasized.



## SECRETARIAL TRAINING



In this course the students do actual office work in typing, transcription, duplicating, care of mail, legal and financial forms, filing, and personality development. This class does mimeographing and typing for school and community organizations and mimeographs school paper. The purpose of the course is to equip advanced commercial students to enter a secretarial position after graduation.

## ADVANCED HOME ECONOMICS

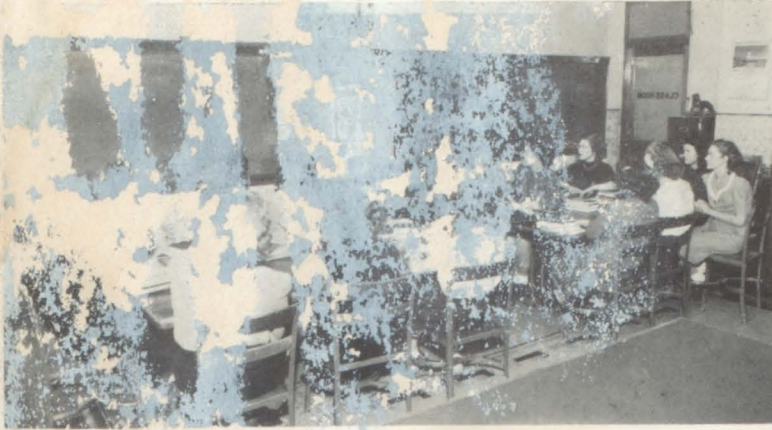
Trying on colored collars to select those colors most becoming to the girls is a phase of the homemaking course. Clothing construction, fundamentals of sewing, and planning a wardrobe are other phases of the clothing units. Meal preparation, study of essential healthful foods, child care, home furnishings, first aid, home nursing, and personal grooming are other units in the course of study.





## NORMAL TRAINING

The normal training department prepares girls for teaching in rural schools. The guidance of especially capable young women into the field of education and the provision of initial preparation for teaching is an important responsibility of our high schools. Pictured is one of the classes in senior reviews endeavoring to carry out these objectives.



## AERONAUTICS

Anticipating needs for present day living, aeronautics is offered in the high school curriculum to prepare the students for living in the "air age."



## LIBRARY

This year there has been a regular librarian to assist students in using the library facilities. Such features as the 1947 *Who's Who in America*, *The Reader's Guide to Periodicals*, and *The Standard Catalog for High School Libraries* have been added. Most of the books acquired this year have been fiction and popular type non-fiction.



## MODERN PROBLEMS

There are a number of objectives of the social science department. Our primary interest is in the preparation for opportunities in fulfillment of citizenship responsibilities and obligations, and working toward a better understanding of our own and other countries. Proper thinking and reasoning in a social science class today will contribute much in the future to world peace and security.



## ADVANCED MATHEMATICS



Advanced mathematics is primarily for those students who plan to enter college or feel a review of first year algebra with added applications would be helpful to them. Solving of more complex problems is mastered. Such topics as relations of variables, factoring, and logarithms are studied. This course brings together basic concepts learned in general mathematics, algebra, and geometry.

## CHEMISTRY LABORATORY

The general objective of chemistry in the high school curriculum is to give the student an insight into the composition and manner of combinations of substances and materials which he meets in everyday life. It serves as a basis for future study for those students with ability who wish to continue the study in college.







## JUNIOR ENGLISH

During the first semester, the emphasis in junior English was on reading and giving oral criticism of American literature. Second semester students read **Hamlet** and **King Lear** and spend some time publishing a book of original short stories, essays, poetry, novels, and one-act plays.

## BEGINNING LATIN

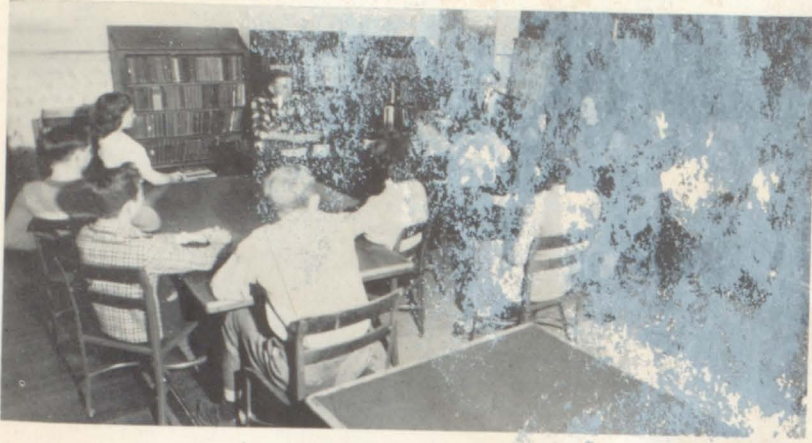
For those planning to enter nurses training or to go on to college, the study of the Latin language is a prerequisite because of its practical value with regard to the derivations of words. Some attention is also given to the mythology of the ancient Romans. This latter study is worth while toward the acquisition of a literary background.



## SPEECH

In public speaking, the student learns how to gather materials for a speech, how to present an effectively organized speech, and how to deliver special occasion speeches. The student also receives training in dramatics and debating. This year the students entered two dramatic contests and sponsored three speech programs.

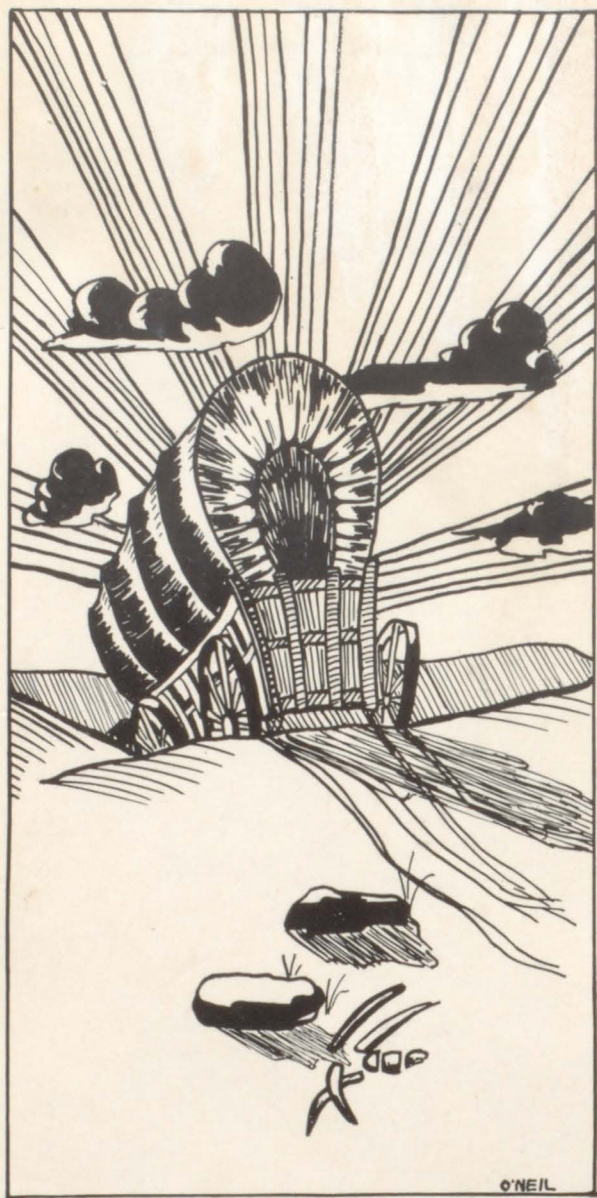
