Debate-Declamatory

This year the Hastings High School debating squad, under the direction of H. L. Siekman, completed a very successful season in interscholastic invitational contests. Out of one-hundred and fifteen decision debates, the class of twenty-one students won ninety-five. The squad participated in six invitational tournaments.

The entire class took part in winning at Kearney when only two defeats were encountered in thirty-eight debates. Four teams were responsible for the trophy in the Class A division of the tourney held at Lebanon, Kansas. Nick Douvas and Jerry Scoutt won the annual Doane College contest and reached the final round of the Hastings College tournament. Hastings' teams advanced to the quarter-final round of the Midland and the Peru College meets. The records made at these state-wide contests placed Hastings among the leaders in forensic work.

Jerry Scoutt was judged the best debater in the Doane College and Hastings College annual invitational tournaments. He was awarded a one-hundred dollar scholarship by each college.

At the District IV debate tournament, held here March 18, Jerry Scoutt and Nick Douvas took top honors, making them eligible for state competition.

They defeated the Benson team in the finals of the state tournament, held in Lincoln on March 31 and April 1, to win the state debate championship, the first in the past twelve years.

Declamatory contestants, under the direction of F. M. Hawk, climaxed a successful season by sending three representatives to the state declamatory contest held in Columbus on April 12.

Representing Hastings in the state declam. were Bill Cowger, Dick Yarnall, and Nick Douvas in the oratorical declamation, dramatic reading, and original oratory division respectively. All three placed first in the local contest and were awarded superior ratings at the district meet. Bill Cowger and Dick Yarnall were also awarded superior ratings at the Hastings College tourney, and Nick Douvas won first place at the Doane College Contest. Nick Douvas and Bill Cowger were rated excellent at the state contest.

The one-act play, "A Good Axe", whose cast included Margery Hall, Jack Bennett, and Dick Yarnall, won superior at Hastings College and excellent in the district tourney. Dick Yarnall won third in the individual actor contest at Hastings College.

Lyle Thomas won first in the local, and excellent in the district meet in extemporaneous speaking. Donis Paro won first in humorous reading at the local contest and second at Kearney. Helen Myers won second in an original humorous reading, and Mary Ann Briggs won third in original oratory at Hastings College.

Basketball Regulars

Playing one of the hardest and longest schedules in the history of the school, Coach Miller's team was worthy of much praise and recognition.

The former lettermen Davies, Dunbar, Kramer, Little, and Weiler formed the nucleus of a strong team which featured speed and accurate passing.

Of the nineteen games played, the team was twice defeated on its own court, by Creighton Prep and North Platte, the latter winning only by a two-point margin gained in an extra period of play. Three games were lost away from home. Among the victims of the Tigers were Lincoln, 1938 State Champions; Jackson, runner-up in the 1939 state tournament; and Benton of St. Joe, Missouri.

Starting the season, Hastings defeated St. Paul and Harvard in the first night of play. A few weeks later the Tigers trounced Lincoln on the Capitol City's court, 48 to 26, one of the season's high-lights. Grand Island was defeated on the local floor in a game thrilling from start to finish. The season came to a close with two consecutive overtime games, the only extra periods of the season. As a result of defeating Beatrice, Crete, Fairbury, and Jackson, and by losing to York only, Hastings became co-holder of the newly formed Mid-East Conference.

During the "Class A" district tournament held at Hastings, the Tigers easily outclassed the very capable teams of St. Paul, Sutton, and Nelson, but were defeated the second time by York in the final round of tournament play.

Hastings went to the state tournament at Lincoln as runner-up in the district, but dropped out of the running when they fell victims of Omaha's Creighton Prep in the initial round. Although they played in the first round only, Dunbar and Davies received honorable mention for outstanding tournament performance.

In spite of the fact that the Tigers had a much smaller team than in recent years, their fast passing and splendid ball handling were superb throughout the season.

Lettermen of the team were Dunbar, Davies, Kramer, Little, Weiler, Payne, McCue, Fuller, Hartman, Miller, and Van Wie. Dunbar was the only three year letterman on the team.






