



Parent-Teacher Association

The Parent-Teacher Association has proved very successful during the past year. The excellent lectures and discussions on topics of interest to the school, brought about a stronger co-operation between the teachers and patrons for the betterment of the school and the community. The first meeting of the year was combined with the reception for the teachers. The officers elected for the year were Superintendent C. S. Gilbert, President; Will Brookley, Persident of the Board of Education, Vice-President; Mrs. E. P. King, Secretary. The meetings were held the third Wednesday of each month. Some very entertaining programs were rendered by the pupils at times and delicious luncheons were served at several of the meetings.



CHEMISTRY LABORATORY

Chemistry

Miss Green has charge of this department. Twelve members of the Junior Class are enrolled.

This is an elementary course in organic chemistry, including chiefly the fundamental principles and a study of metallic and non-metallic substances. Emphasis is placed upon the mastery of valence, reactions and equations, which will enable the student to understand and interpret the simpler processes of chemical action and to solve practical problems.

One of the best supplies of chemicals and chemical equipment to be found in any high school is placed to the student's advantage in completing this course.

Physics

This department under the instruction of Miss Green, receives much interest among the sixteen members enrolled from the Senior Class. Some of the best equipment that can be obtained is furnished by the School Board.

This course gives us a complete survey of the first principles of Physics and treats of the function and fundamental principles of some of the following: Matter and Energy, Gravity, Motion, Work and Machines, Pressure and Power, Sound, Light, Magnetism, and Electrostatics.


Four periods of laboratory and three periods of recitation is the time outlined each week for the student in which to complete this course.



Home Economics



The Edgar schools are now approved for H. E. under the Smith-Hughes Act. During the past year fine equipment has been added to what we already had in this department. Three rooms have been provided for the carrying on of the work, namely: a cooking laboratory, a dining room, and a sewing room. The cooking laboratory is supplied with gas stoves and everything necessary for the preparation of meals. The dining room is equipped with the best silverware, linens, china, etc. The sewing room has five machines, one of which is motor-driven, lockers, cabinets, etc.







Manual Training and Mechanical Drawing

The results of registration for the Fall term of 1919 in Manual Training showed 16 boys desiring to take first year wood work and 12 boys mechanical drawing. Most of the boys, having had one year wood work, preferred mechanical drawing in place of advanced wood work.

The beginners' wood work class commenced work in the making of simple exercises, in marking, planing, sawing, and thereby learning the fundamental principles of wood work. The next step was making exercises from working drawings, and the final step threw the student upon his own resourcefulness, when he was then required to make his own plans and drawings, when he had chosen what he wished to make.

In all very satisfactory results were obtained through the work in the Manual Training Department.





Commerce

Although having been established in the Edgar High School only last year, the success of this department from the students' standpoint is most encouraging. This course is so arranged that the student may complete the whole of the ascribed commercial work in his or her four years of High School and yet not interfere with the regular course of study adapted by this school.

This commercial training consists of an eighteen months' course in Bookkeeping, Shorthand and Typewriting, and also a nine months' course in Business English. Some of the best equipment to be found in the state is used to the advantage of students carrying the above courses.

In bookkeeping one of the best systems that can be provided for High School work is provided. This system gives special emphasis to the theory of debits and credits and all the essentials of actual business practice in some of the following: Implements and Grain, Retail Grocery, Lumber and Coal, etc. One system dwells on the fundamental principles of the present Income Tax.

Typewriting seems to be given the most attention by the students. The touch system is used and although not completing the required course, many students even today have attained speed tests of great rapidity, and their accuracy and neatness are perfect. Fourteen of the best standard machines are used and each machine is kept in the best of order.

The value of this work is gaining greater popularity each day. The business world calls for men and women who have thorough Commercial Education. Thousands of young people will be needed to fill the great demand for the new commercial employment in connection with the development of our internal and foreign commerce, and the new branches of work that are opening each year.

THE SEASON

Glancing through the 1919 annals of Southern Nebraska football, Edgar stands foremost in having one of the strongest teams in that section.

Although handicapped for lack of material and with very disagreeable football weather to carry on practice, Coach Kreuger developed a very successful football team which, although suffering a few early defeats, came back in the latter part of the season and gained a similar reputation of former football teams of Edgar High School of which she has always been proud.

On Friday, October 3rd, after four weeks of much interrupted practice, due to the bad weather conditions, the Edgar team met the strong Geneva eleven on the local gridiron for the initial game of the season. After holding Geneva down to two touchdowns in the first half, their weight and experience finally became too much for the less experienced home eleven and Edgar was defeated, although fighting to the last, by a score of 39-0.

Coach Kreuger through some changes in the lineup and drilling the team through four afternoons of real stiff practice improved his team to such an extent that the following Friday the Fairfield team was defeated on their own gridiron, 6-0.

Six hundred people witnessed the Edgar-Harvard game played on Bethany's baseball park during the big Ox Roast. Edgar may consider this a victorious defeat because after rushing the visiting team to their five-yard line in the first few minutes of play, the ball was lost on downs and Harvard, recovering the ball, by a series of line bucks and fake end runs received the first touchdown. Again they repeated this before Edgar could tighten up. The first half ended with Harvard leading, 14-0.

By some never-to-be-forgotten fluke Harvard made another touchdown at the beginning of the second half and then Edgar came back strong, playing real football, but starting too late. Two touchdowns were made in quick succession and with another one in sight, the final whistle blew with Harvard victorious, 21-12.

In a return game with Geneva, with the temperature reading below freezing, the hardest game of the season was played, with Geneva receiving the breaks. After bringing the ball down to Geneva's yard line time and time again the home team did not have the push to register a touchdown, and had to be satisfied with a lone safety, while Geneva planted the ball twice behind our goal for touchdowns, due their efficient passing and long end runs.

Not to be daunted by hard luck, Edgar again defeated Fairfield, simply playing them off their feet, and before the final whistle blew had scored 37 points to their opponent's 20. Fairfield was very much surprised over the outcome of the game, as they brought down at least a hundred rooters to help them bring home the victory. Edgar showed wonderful improvement over former games and their ability with the forward pass and fast end runs was unsurpassed.

Probably before the smallest attendance during the season, Edgar was victorious over the weak Clay Center team. The weather was very disagreeable and with time called out several times during the game, due to various injuries sustained, not the fastest kind of a football exhibition was to be had. However Edgar, on the offensive the greater part of the game, had no trouble piling up the score of 31 to Clay Center's 7.

The following week Edgar played the Superior eleven, said to be one of the strongest teams in southern Nebraska, being then only defeated team to score against Beatrice, who claims the State Championship. Edgar put up a hard fight and with Superior leading 13 to 0 after they had scored two touchdowns in the first half through their superior weight and speed, Edgar came back strong in the third period and by clever fakes and end runs placed the ball behind Superior's goal line for an earned touchdown against this powerful eleven.

Superior seemed to be baffled by the fakes of the local team and only by sheer luck did they keep Edgar from scoring again this period. In the fourth period after Superior recovered the ball, they completed a wonderful forward pass for a sixty-yard gain, being made possible only by their efficient passer and fast ends, bringing the ball to Edgar's ten-yard line. By line bucks they succeeded in earning another touchdown. As darkness was fast approaching the players could not distinguish their team from their opponents and before the period was over Superior obtained another touchdown through that reason. Several fumbles were made and the ball was completely lost track of until a Superior man had snatched the ball in the dusk and ran across Edgar's goal line without any opposition.

Due to the extremely muddy roads the Edgar team left home early the next Friday, in cars, for Hastings, and did not arrive until very late. In consequence a short four ten-minute-quarter game had to be staged, to prohibit the game from being called on account of darkness.

Hastings started things off with a rush and in the first period made their first and only touchdown by a spectacular fifty-yard run through the entire Edgar team, by one of their fast and wily halfbacks. They kicked goal, giving them a seven-point lead. This did not discourage the home team and coming back strong in the second and third periods with cross bucks and line plunges succeeded in gaining a touchdown, also kicking goal, making the score a tie, 7-7. Throughout the fourth period neither team was able to score, leaving the score a tie.

Edgar should feel proud of holding this great middle western school to a tie, as Hastings is one of the best schools in this part of the state.

Thanksgiving day was not exactly an ideal one for a football game. With the field covered with snow and ice the Edgar team outplayed Hebron in every department of the game, scoring two touchdowns against that strong eleven, while they had to journey home carrying an exceptionally large goose egg. Hebron after going through the season with but one defeat to their credit and carrying the scalps of Geneva, Exeter, and Chester on their belts thought that they would have an easy time in defeating the locals. Such was their great mistake, because the home team, after stopping the first rush of their exceedingly strong line bucks, politely recovered the ball and marched down the field twice in succession for touchdowns. The first half ended with Edgar 12 and Hebron 0.

In the second half, although outplaying the visitors, Edgar was not able to score again and the last game of the season ended most successfully with Edgar victorious, 12-0.

Basketball

The 1919-1920 Basketball season started off with a rush. With only four nights of practice, Coach Kreuger had selected a team which trimmed the strong Tobias quintet the following night, 28-16. Edgar Town team, Davenport and Holdrege were easily taken into camp before Christmas vacation.

Christmas vacation slowed up the basketball work considerably, but not enough to bother the home team in defeating Fairfield by a lop-sided score of 66-16.

The Superior game may be considered one of the most important victories of the season. With the score standing 9-8 in the first half, with Edgar in the lead, the second half was finished with neither team able to roll up another point. This probably is the first game ever witnessed on the Edgar floor in which no scores were registered during one of the 20-minute half periods. Edgar should feel proud of this victory, as it meant later on in the season that the Class B champions of the state had been defeated by the local quintet.

From the town of Hebron hale some of the poorest losers in the world. Still feeling the sting of defeat of the Thanksgiving football game and thinking they did not receive a square deal, in which they are mistaken, they took advantage of the boys' and girls' basketball teams and their respective coaches and proceeded to even matters up, the only way in which it seemed possible. In consequence the Hebron teams, aided by the referee and over 300 spectators handed Edgar their first defeat of the season by the score of 26-19. This game was not exactly a defeat: it was taken away from us; and every player on the Edgar team received scars and bruises, showing that Hebron had to do some tall scrapping to pull anything like that over on the home team, even if the odds were against them. From the athletic standpoint of the Edgar High School it seems that relations should be severed with the Hebron school, until this poor sportsmanship feud ceases to exist.

Five more victories in succession were added to our record with Clay Center, Fairfield, Holdrege and Nelson, twice, falling before the onslaught of the Edgar team's brilliant teamwork and accurate goal shooting.

Hastings handed the local five a stinging defeat on their Junior High floor, and abruptly stopped our greatly increasing line of victories. The locals were baffled by the slick floor of the Hastings gymnasium and not having solid footing, did not show up to their past form, in team work and goal shooting. Hastings thus captured an easy victory by a score of 43-20.

Matters were evened up the next Friday when Clay Center was defeated 38-7 on the local floor, in the last game of the season before the County and State Tournaments.

"EDGAR WINS CHAMPIONSHIP"

This was the outcome of the Third Annual Clay County Basket Ball Tournament, at Clay Center, February 27 and 28.

Six teams were entered, Sutton, Harvard, Trumbull, Clay Center, Fairfield, and Edgar, representing some of the strongest teams in this part of the state. After the teams had been duly matched by drawings, the first round was played with the following results:

The last game was forfeited to Edgar as Trumbull failed to appear. This left Sutton, Fairfield and Edgar to compete for the championship honors. Edgar drew a bye, leaving Sutton and Fairfield to play in the semi-finals. The Sutton second team defeated Fairfield by a score of 18-15.

Saturday evening after Harvard had defeated Clay Center for the consolation prize, Edgar and Sutton battled for the championship of the county, in one of the hardest fought games ever played on the Clay Center floor, before a crowd numbering about eight hundred people.

Edgar jumped into the lead after ten minutes of hard, fast playing and at the end of the first half was in the lead, 11-7.

Sutton came back strong in the second half and after making a free goal and lucky field goal, shot from the center of the field, while Edgar got a free goal, were only one lone point behind the local five. Edgar then, by a fast spurt, of which their accurate passing and team work were a feature, again widened the margin by a field goal and no time from then on did Sutton throw a scare into Edgar's championship hopes. The faculty and students appreciated the patronage and support given to athletics by the School Board and patrons of E. H. S. during the past year.

THE TENTH ANNUAL NEBRASKA STATE TOURNAMENT

At the State Tournament the Edgar team classified in Class B, and playing Sidney the first day did not show up as well as was expected. Although having a wonderful record and standing as one of the foremost in winning Class B honors, completely lost every bit of basketball science they ever did know, and went down to defeat at the hands of the Sidney quintet by a score of 19-12. Edgar was thus eliminated from the tournament, and their hopes of winning in their class were shattered.

With fourteen victories to their credit, consisting of some of the strongest teams in the state, and with but three defeats, the E. H. S. boys' basketball team closed one of the most successful seasons in the annals of the school.

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
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
